New year, new script!

The 2023 edition of ShakesCollage is up and running! Actors David Merritt Jr., Fatima V. Njie, and Jessica Perry met with actor and director Sherri Raeford, actor and assistant director Chappell Upper, and stage manager Sarah E. Wilson on December 6th, 2022 (12/6/2022) at the Greensboro

Cultural Center for their first rehearsal of the new script. The only one not present was actor Joey Upper who was feeling a little under the weather that day. However, he was able to get up to speed in time to preview the show with Chappell, DJ, Jessica, and Sarah on January 17th, 2023 (1/17/2023) at Southeast Guilford High School where fellow Shared Radiance regular, Chris Veneris, teaches theatre. Fatima, the sole "newbie" in this year's cast, made her debut in the first round of performances on January 25th and 26th (1/25/2023 and 1/26/2023) at Caldwell County's high schools. The cast has already had one other day of performances for Inkem Baker's classes at North Forsyth High School on February 3rd.

The 2023 version of ShakesCollage features some classic and well-loved scenes from other versions' past such as Sonnet 143 (a.k.a. The Chicken Sonnet), the rap of the prologue from Romeo & Juliet, and, of course, Pyramus & Thisby from A Midsummer Night's Dream. A brand new scene featured in the 45-minute educational Shakespeare revue is Richard II's deposition monologue from Richard II. While not a scene, another original feature is some fight choreography by Taylor Neese. The script is updated and rearranged each year to provide any students or teachers (or anyone, really) who may have seen the show previously with something fresh.

Chappell Upper, and Shared Radiance Performing Arts Company, have been selected for a Greensboro Residency for Original Works, or GROW, residency through Creative Greensboro. The residency will run from June 12th (6/12/2023) through July 30th (7/30/2023) and will be used to adapt Pride & Prejudice into a forty-five to sixty-minute play called Judgemental, Much?: A Rapid Retelling of Pride & Prejudice. This piece was inspired by ShakesCollege's five-minute comedic take on Romeo and Juliet which utilizes actors capable of playing multiple roles as well as Chappell's quarantine-fueled reading of Jane Austen's works. Several Shared Radiance practitioners are already planning logistical and production aspects of this show. Auditions will take place in mid-spring.

Shared Radiance Films created a horror film called *Fruitful* and Celtic Friday Productions created a comedy called *Road Rage*. Every short film entered was required to include a certain character, prop, and line. The character could be Duane or Diana Fortran, a musician. The prop had to be keys and the line could be "Don't lie to me" or "Do not lie to me."

Williams assisted with the production, and Kristian A. Torres catered. Kenzie Greeson was the 2nd assistant cameraperson. Jody Miller was the location and shop head.

Many held multiple titles on the team. Eppie Jo Miller was the team leader and executive producer. Joey Upper served as co-director, producer, writer, and

Andi Schroemer voice acted and was the 1st assistant cameraperson. Clara Wilson was a voice actor and the production coordinator. Fatima V. Njie was the director of photography and one of the editors. Philip McLaughlin worked in the electric and editing departments. Sarah Wilson was the producer and the Unit Productions Manager. Special thanks were given to Sherri Raeford, Greg & Katie Butler, Bumi, Midnight, & Pipsqueak.

Celtic Friday Productions also boasted a few Shared Radiance players. Linda Veneris took the helm as the director. Chris Veneris oversaw the whole thing as the producer. Sky-Gwendolyn Veneris composed original music for the short film, acted as a production assistant, and performed the

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role of "Sarah." Michael Burke played the role of "Frank Fortran."

Both movies were honored at the "Best Of" Screening held at the Carolina Theatre. Fruitful won Honorable Mention Best Sound Design and Honorable Mention Best Costumes. Road Rage proved to be popular as the Audience Favorite of the Group C Screening. Fruitful and Road Rage are both available for viewing on YouTube.

MIDSUMMER IN OCTOBER

With a Splash of Victorian Melodrama

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A Midsummer Night's Dream by William Shakespeare is nothing new to Shared Radiance, but we keep returning to it time and time again. Our most recent iteration of this play held performances at Studio 609, Paul J. Ciener Botanical Garden, Forsyth Court, Greensboro Cultural Center (Room 413), and Camel City Playhouse in the fall of 2022. I had a chance to pick the brain of the director, Jenni Pirkey, about the experience.

Chappell: What was your inspiration for the victorian theme? How do you think it translated with audiences?

Jenni: I wanted to come up with a fun way to include the audience in our new post-COVID world. So knowing that in the past, they also had to deal with pandemics, I decided to do some research. I couldn't find anything, so I needed a break. I looked up old cartoons including Dudley Doright. I got to giggling so hard that I thought this style of show would be fun. So that is how I decided on Victorian melodrama.

Creating signs for the audience to respond to just went along with the theme. As we went through it with the audience, I heard a ton of laughter from the audience. They seemed to really get into it which made the whole show worth it.

Why is A Midsummer Night's Dream one of Shakespeare's most popular works? Why does it endure?

Love surpasses time. This is the main theme of A Midsummer Night's Dream. Every person can relate to one of the character's stories. Be it the unrequited love Helena has for Demetrius, the jealous love of Titania and Oberon, or the parental/overprotective love Egeus for Hermia, everyone can connect to the story in some way.

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How did the live production compare to the Zoom production put up during quarantine?

Oh, goodness. So many differences. On the zoom production, I was more dependent on my tech director to make sure the final picture would be clear. For the in-person production, my actors really brought the visual aspects to life. For Zoom, we created a great YouTube piece. It was different and creative. The actors had to learn to connect to each other through a lens, and they did a fabulous job. The in-person show allowed for more one on one time with the actors allowing for a more personal connection.

Both were amazing shows in their own right, and I am thankful to have done both styles.

Do you have anyone you would like to thank? Any final words?

I really want to thank my cast and crew for all of their time and hard work. Without them, there would not have been such a great show. I also want to personally thank Joey Upper, Martha Upper, Eppie Jo Miller, and Sherri Raeford for putting up with all my crazy ideas.

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THE BALLAD OF THE BAND OF ASPIRING RADIANT DRAMA STUDENTS

One of our Teen Practitioners reflects on the beginning of B.A.R.D.S. Written by Fatima V. Njie Edited by Chappell Upper & Eppie Jo Miller

Most have heard the saying, "you have to spend money to make money." It is a sad truth that is especially unfair to young artists. For those with a passion

for acting, it can be hard to find affordable extracurricular education for enthusiastic young ones who come from modest families. Acting classes can cost anywhere from 500 to 5000 dollars, and these courses usually only cover a tiny aspect of performance art. This infamous income barrier prevents many enthusiastic young artists from pursuing what they want to do. It was this problem that first sparked our discussion of BARDS. The Shared Radiance and BARDS

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leadership team knows firsthand how shockingly expensive acting and theatrical classes can be. The BARDS leadership team, a group of active and supportive theatre professionals in the local theatre industry, strives to provide a free theatrical education for those fortunate enough to realize what an amazing art form theatre is and want to learn more about it.

This past year we typically met on the second Saturday of the month. During the very first class we asked the teens what they want to learn and the experience they would like to get out of BARDS. Our team is made of primarily technical theatre "geeks" like me, Becca, and Eppie, and we were thrilled to hear that they wanted to learn not only about acting but things like lighting, set design, and color theory as well.

In the beginning, we focused on teaching them the basics so we focused on the roots of theatre in Commedia del' Arte. We came up with fun activities that also reinforced important lessons that are the basis of any successful theatrical project. One of which is the value of teamwork. As all of us on the BARDS team know from experience, theatre is a collaborative art. Whether or not an ensemble works together effectively can make or break a performance. In one of our first sessions, we had the students collaborate and design the BARDS logo together in a similar fashion a design team would work together on a show.

Then, we shifted to teach them how to score a script. A technique that requires one to understand and break down the script in order to distinguish important moments within it. This strategy is not only used by actors but the design team as well. From September to November BARDS was focused on preparing students to perform monologues using the skills they have learned and show off their talent in a showcase at the end of the year. Using this lesson as the vanguard for what BARDS has in store has many benefits. Learning a monologue can help develop public speaking skills. For our kids who are interested in acting, it



is good to have a Shakespeare monologue on hand to whip out for an upcoming audition. Our team was also able to record each of their monologues so not only can they use them for a digital audition, they can look back down the road reflecting on the growth and progress they made since the first BARDS Showcase.

This upcoming year, we plan to branch out and talk about more aspects of technical theatre. We hope to work together with a local theatre and give the students a tour backstage so they can see where all the magic happens. As always, BARDS will remain free to the local young artist. We had a blast during our first year and hope to have an even better 2023.

The performances went up on January 27th (1/27/2023) at 7:00 PM and January 28th (1/28/2023) at 2:00 PM in Room 413 at the Greensboro Cultural Center after rehearsals began in December. We're very grateful to everyone who made this year's variety show fundraiser a success! The funds we raise from this show help support our spring Shakespeare production, which will be The Comedy of Errors in 2023.

Several wonderful acts were presented over the course of the show. Dance acts included David Merritt Jr. performing Friend Like Me from Aladdin (2019 Film) by Alan Menken and Sherri & Steve Raeford performing a ballroom dance to Smooth by Santana.
